Hunter ed team lauded as 'Best in State'

Fivesome taught 245 kids, adults in 2019

A team of volunteers with RFSC connections has been honored by the Wisconsin DNR 2019 Hunter Education Group of the Year among more than 200 statewide hunter ed teams. The group also seized the opportunity on Aug. 8th to present an award of appreciation to board president Travis Schnick for use of club facilities for teaching and practice.

The teaching team led by club member Pat Knorn, formerly of Roberts now of Danbury, was recognized by Linda Xiong, WDNR Outdoor Skills Trainer- West Central Region, Eau Claire, and Ashley Van Egtern, WDNR Hunter Ed. Assistant Administrator, from Madison, who used the August board meeting as a chance to meet with the teaching team and award the recognition, which was delayed by COVID restrictions.

In 2021, Wisconsin had 28,243 students complete Hunter Education certifications. Roughly 58 percent of those students were 17 and under. There are currently about 2,800 active unique instructors certified to teach Hunter Education in the State of Wisconsin, Van Egtern said.

"We love being able to personally present awards/accomplishments as our schedules al-

low," Van Egtern noted afterward.

Knorn and instructors each received new instructor hats, complimentary Vortex binoculars and first-aid kits from the two WDNR representatives in appreciation for their efforts.

"I tell the kids, if we need to yell at you, I will. You're handling a firearm that will kill somebody," said Knorn, noting that the students are also urged to point out shortcomings in their instructors. "If you see something (dangerous), say something."

Knorn's passion for firearm safety was ignited after she and her late husband, Jim, took the class so he could hunt out of state. Soon afterward, one of their instructors "volun-told us" to help out with a subsequent class. They were quickly hooked.

Club member Keith Bonse of North Hudson has been an active part of Knorn's team for about five years. He first became involved with mentoring about a decade ago when his daughter, Faith, joined the BB gun league at the Hudson Rod, Gun & Archery Club. The WDNR restructured the curriculum and shifted course focus from a classroom lecture to more direct learning approach, Bonse said. The change was prompted when state law-

with peers at St. Croix Central High School. She also plays other sports, her dad said.

Students now spend the majority of class time learning to understand and safely handle firearms, he said.

"Pat really does have a heart of gold," said Bonse. "We're all in it for the students."

Time needed to teach the class has been reduced from 20-25 hours to about 12-15 hours -- typically two Saturdays and a Sunday. Outside speakers like game wardens still take part and share reallife stories, but that sometimes occurs while kids have lunch during an all-day session.

"Most of the instructors we have are vert peopleoriented," said Bonse. "We're all different in our own way, but it's an extremely good group. We don't try to hammer the information into the kids."

Knorn, who describes herself as "brutally honest", said the traditional "long-ass" classroom lecturestyle course had many students bored to dozing, or doodling in their instruction books. In her classes, students are quickly assigned to small groups and engaged with WDNR-issued safe weapons in their hands most of the time. They're challenged to familiarize with at least five different gun actions and constantly reminded of real world dangers of muzzle direction and fire zones.

"We are strictly safety priority," Pat said. "We don't teach'em how to gut a deer. They can learn that from Grandpa." Instead, the focus is how to safely climb and exit a tree stand, cross fences, load and unload a weapon.

Learning is so hands-on "they don't have time to

doodle or take a nap," said Knorn. "It's fun to see the lightbulb come on."

During 2018-19, Knorn and her team conducted 19 classes and graduated 245 kids — including some with learning disabilities.

Board member Belinda Hopp, who coaches youth shooting sports, complimented Knorn on her nononsense approach. "You can't throw the entire instruction book at a kid and expect it all to stick."

Knorn's approach to teaching is popular with students and parents. Van Egtern said the WDNR tries not to micromanage its teaching teams.

"Each group is definitely unique! There are parameters; policies and procedures, as well as lesson plans that instructors must adhere to when delivering the Hunter Education curriculum. That being said, each instructor and group are free to add their own flavor and unique style within those parameters," she stated. "Those individual characteristics that are brought forward is what makes working with Wisconsin's Hunter Education Volunteer Instructors so much fun!"

The program's is to promote safety, conservation and Wisconsin's hunting heritage through a comprehensive educational program, said Van Egtern.

"Hunting in Wisconsin is safe, as demonstrated by the continued downward trend in hunting incidents. Wisconsin has a strong tradition of safe hunting, and it is everyone's responsibility to continue this tradition," Van Egtern wrote in email correspondence.

As many of you may know through past communications and annual meeting discussion, the 9.2 acre property purchased next door has been paid for.

Through planning

and the initiative by

directors over nearly

20 years, the club established and funded a land acquisition- savings fund. Those savings plus the proceeds of four years- worth of fundraising efforts and member contributions to pay off the acquisition quickly.

Members may be asking, "What is next?'

Board members and other volunteers are continuing clean-up of the land. Extensive work has been com-

- An exterminator continues to visit regularly to curtail destruction by pocket gophers and moles on the property.
- Best Built Fence has been contracted to extend four-foot security fencing west from the gate along Rifle Range Rd. across the south line to the driveway.

pleted to the area nearest the clubhouse, with efforts to continue westward on a pay-as-you-go basis.

Among work that remains:

- Grade and seed around the shed and the east end of the property yet this fall.
- Install chain link fence along Rifle Range road west to new driveway.

Future efforts will include:

- Fence the remainder of the property
- Clean-up of stumps and brush piles, and grade the rest of the cleared area.
- Plant additional trees in selected areas around the perimeter.
- Improve and further secure

the existing shed making it more useable for storage.

The board hopes to continue building a financial "nest egg" which could be used for future land acquisitions, legal fees or future building renovations or projects.

The stronger our financial position, the easier it will be for the existing and future boards to thoughtfully consider options.

Taxes on the property, valued at \$133,000, were \$1,565 last year -- down from more than \$3,300 after the parcel was purchased. Taxes were lowered after buildings were removed.

Taxes on the club's original 15-acre parcel were \$2,275 in 2022.

The RFSC provides a safe place for members to shoot and have fun and also hosts a variety of beginning and youth shooting programs. In 2019, over 2200 hours were logged instructing youth 4-H shooters. Kids learned about safety and practiced disciplines of using a shotgun, small bore .22 pistol, muzzle-loader, .22 rifle, air rifle and archery (including wildlife ecology and hunting skills.)

Volunteers also taught Hunter Ed. classes, supervised trap programs for River Falls and St. Croix Central students, and oversaw RWVA Project Appleseed rifle marksmanship and Beginning Shooter courses. It's important to realize the role the RFSC plays the education of today's adults and tomorrow's leaders.
