



Volunteers thanked for a productive Clean-up Day

Early morning fog and light rain didn't discourage 29 club members and



volunteers from landscaping chores, clearing brush, whacking trees, pulling an old fenceline and cleaning two sheds on club property, Saturday, Sept. 24th.

"It was probably the best clean-up day in a long time," Range Master Ed Gibb told board members in October. Volunteers hauled more than eight tandem-trailer loads of brush, lopped and hauled away the remains of seven trees, trimmed trees near the ar-

chery range, cleaned sheds, and dragged, rock-picked, seeded and mulched about an acre around the remaining building on the new acreage.

The crew included a contingent of adults and students from the Baldwin Christian School -- the newest group to use Club facilities for trap-shooting.

Directors approved Gibb's request to rent a grinder to remove stumps on the new acreage and some on the trap range.

Gibb also reported the club's old pop machine yielded \$160.10 at an
