3D archery concept proposed

Advocates looking for member input

Directors heard broad details at the April meeting about an initiative by members Nick Larson and Eric Sterner to explore the development of a 3-dimensional archery course on club property.

The men said they'd work on a "second-tier" sketch for a proposal that should include -- in the words of president John Pietenpol --"safety, cost, steps and scope..." for the board to consider.

Sterner said his interest stems from a desire to shoot in an archery league, but would prefer to do so within the River Falls Sportsmen's Club rather than having to join a new club. He has been shooting trap at RFSC, and thinks the addition of 3D would enhance the shooting sports offerings, adding that he's willing to donate time and energy to help make that happen.

It's thought that a small course that utilizes the 40-yard existing range could be constructed for about \$6,000. That amount would likely buy 12-15 3D targets.

"I think it would be good for the club to offer a more robust Archery offering. I know many of the guys I shoot and hunt with also enjoy archery and think it could help increase membership and potentially engagement from our current membership," Stern-

Invite: Indianhead league offers fun outings, friendly environment

For those who enjoy shooting trap, keep an eye out for new clubhouse signage about an upcoming Indianhead trap league shoot at another club. For newer members who might not know how to participate, President John Pietenpol offers up this short backgrounder to entice more trap shooters to take part:

The Indianhead trap league takes place at 10 different trap ranges in our general area with the most distant being a bit under two hours away. Each year, five of the 10 participating clubs host a shooting event at their respective ranges.

Shoots are held from 9 am to 5 pm, on Sundays in June and July, with one more shoot in August.

Participants shoot two back-to-back rounds of trap for \$12. It's easy to sign up. Just show up, go to the registration table, and register to shoot on a squad. If you'd like one or both of the rounds to count as a score (s) for the summer league, just declare it to another club member at the shoot. Otherwise, you can let the RFSC league manager know prior to shooting the rounds.

Who can participate? Any junior or adult member of our club can attend any of the shoots. For River Falls Sportsmen's Club to qualify at each of the shoots, we must have at least seven shooters post scores at the event. In the past it wasn't a problem achieving that level of participation at different clubs, but over the last few years we have struggled to get seven shooters to show up at some of the events.

This is a great way to broaden your shooting skills and to represent the

River Falls Sportsmen's Club!

If you have any questions, please contact me. I have personally participated in these shoots for at least five years. They are great fun especially—if you round up a few other members to travel along. The clubs all provide food and refreshments too.

'Appleseed' participants



Jack worked at Bob & Arnie's TV for a time before joining Ecolab, where he spent 43 years as a mechanical engineer retiries in 2016. neer, retiring in 2016.

Jack was a member of the Methodist Church in New Richmond, serving as Trustee chairperson. He was also a dedicated Mason and member of the Zor Shrine Club. He also enjoyed ham radio communication, baking and doing embroidery.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Ellwood and Beth Thomas, and his adopted mother, Ardis Campbell Thomas, as well as sister Cathie Campbell and brother Don Campbell.

Jack is survived by wife Diane, daughters Katie (Dan) Shipman and Pam (Olin) Glick, and granddaughter Asher Shipman. He also leaves behind his sister Jill Thomas, sister-in-law Sally Campbell, and other relatives.

Memorials are preferred to the Shriners Children's Hospital. Services were held March 27th at the New Richmond United Methodist Church with interment in Nora Cemetery, Rice Lake. Bakken-Young Funeral & Cremation Services provided arrangements.

Esekiel "Zeke" Mendoza, club member, veteran and 22-year year boiler plant operator at UW-River Falls, died on April 8, 2025. He was 59.

A native of Richmond, Calif., he joined the U.S. Marines after graduating Richmond High School in 1984. He was an Airborne Ranger -- a "testament to the guiet courage that Airborne Ranger -- a "testament to the quiet courage that defined his life", his family said. He later served in the Wisconsin National Guard, completing multiple overseas deployments and "continuing to build friendships based on loyalty and mutual respect. His service was never about recognition. It was about duty, integrity, and brotherhood," his obituary stated. During his military service, he also met the love of his life, Roxann — his best friend and soulmate.

Zeke is survived by his wife, Roxann (Muto) Mendoza; daughter through marriage, Tara (Richard) Lueneburg, and their children — his beloved grandchildren Aydin, Kaiya, and Xavier, New Richmond; and son through marriage, Trevor Brown of River Falls. Board briefs

- -- TREASURER BEN GAUS confirmed at the March director's meeting that he'd purchased two truckloads of birds; one was scheduled to arrive in April, the second in June, scoring a significant price discount.
- -- AWARD PLAQUES FOR 2024 have been ordered and are in-production. Plagues from 2022 and 2023 are at the clubhouse, awaiting pickup by the respective honorees. Also, a new computer has been procured and deployed at the club, thanks to Gaus "and friends," he reported.
- -- THERE WAS DISCUSSION in March about how to best invest a \$1,500 gift from Margaret Wilson, given in honor of late husband and member, Ron Wilson. Board consensus was to look at replacing the infield lights with LED lighting. The project is likely to involve rewiring due to voltage issues, so director Dan Herum offered to search out cost estimates on that and bringing a line from the deeper well on the new acreage to the clubhouse. In April, Herum reported the LED upgrade would likely cost more than \$3,000. He hadn't received an estimate on the well line. No action was taken.
- A SPIRITED EXCHANGE unfolded over an idea brought to the board by Ed Gibb from a trap league participant. The member suggested inviting punch-card purchasers who upon using up a punch card, could jot their name and address on the spent card and place it in a jar for a periodic drawing awarding a free punch card. Talk focused on what benefit such a freebie would have for the club, given that punch card pricing which doesn't particularly benefit the organization. The idea ultimately died on a split board vote with the rationale that club members need not subsidize regular shooters.
- -- VICE-PRESIDENT PARKER HEISE noted that range lead reclamation remains a possibility as a vendor contacted him noting they'd be visiting South St. Paul and a central Wisconsin location in coming weeks. Heise also announced that Cody Krueger of Premier Property Maintenance, River Falls, had accepted the job of mowing and trimming club grounds on an as-needed basis. Other vendors required visits on a weekly basic -- something beyond our needs, Heise reported in April.
- -- CLUB MANAGER ERIC SWENSON reported the presence of three deceased goat carcasses along the boundary fence near the benches on the 200yard range. It's believed they were dumped there in protest of club activities. President John Pietenpol suggested removal be included on the list of clean-up day activities -- without reprisal against anyone.
- AFTER ONLY ONE APPLICATION was received for the RFSC scholarship ahead of the April 30th deadline, President John Pietenpol suggested the deadline be extended until May 31st, with the scholarship to be awarded later this vear.
